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Parson's Perspective

Today we see there are many gifts that can be attributed to the gifts of the spirit? The list in 1 Corinthians 12 includes: wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing. Miracles, prophecy, discernment, languages and interpretations. The list today may include, school teachers, engineers, entrepreneurs, doctors, preachers, Sunday school teachers, diplomats and translators. Gifts in today's context suggest that all our skills have been given to us by God. We need to take a moment to review our gifts and think about how our particular gifts may have been given to us by God.

Think for a moment about your particular gifts and ask a few questions. How do my gifts fit in the big picture of the community around me? What service do my gifts provide to others? Have I seen times where my gifts have been used by God? Some of these questions would be easily answered by those who went to Staten Island to help those after Sandy. But further reflection will show that they apply to our daily lives.

As we think about praying for healing, could it be that the means that God uses to affect our healing is through the skills of medical doctors? When we ask for our daily bread, could this need be met through agricultural endeavors? Could technology be a gift that we need to use as stewards of God's benevolence? When Jesus says "if you give to one of the least of these you are giving to me", are we to use our industrial achievements or individual abilities to help those in depressed areas of the world? As we consider our various skills, could they be the very means that God uses to fulfill? Micah 6:8, "He has told you, human one, what is good and what the LORD requires from you: to do justice, embrace faithful love, and walk humbly with your God."

Saturday Night Praise Generosity

Our new ministry, Saturday Night Praise. provides a great opportunity for those who would like a time for praising God through song. Worship is offered for those who, due to work or other reasons, cannot attend Sunday worship. Anyone who does not have a church home is also invited. Although this service meets a great need in our community, not enough people know about it.

Stepping up with a generous donation for advertising and food, Nel Huck felt that a gift of \$500 would get us started. Juliet Getty, who has a marketing background, and Nel put their heads together to get the word out. Early in September, 1000 post cards will be sent out to the community. These cards will point out: 5:00 pm, Food and Fellowship; 6:00 pm, Praise the Lord in Song. The cost for this mailing will be provided with part of Nel's contribution and some from Juliet's Equine Nutrition business. There will be available funds to provide food for a few weeks to get the ball rolling. Following this initial effort, more post cards can be sent out as needed.

Various members and friends of the church have offered to sponsor food for the Saturday Night Praise. If you would like to offer a donation toward food expenses, please give it to the church office. Past experience has shown that the cost varies from around \$10 to \$50 depending on whether one prepares the food or it is purchased.

As the Lord leads with the cooperation of members of the church, the Saturday Night Praise will become a blessed ministry of our congregation.

Centuries ago Christians welcomed strangers into their homes, sharing whatever they had—often only a morsel of barley bread.

In our church, we greet visitors with a "Welcome Bag" that contains a small loaf of bread as a reminder of that ancient biblical custom. Also in the bag is a flyer that explains the bread ministry tradition, as well as some helpful information about our church.

The Fellowship Committee provides the supplies for baking three mini-loaves, (a kit containing a quickbread mix, three foil pans, and a quart-sized freezer bag that will hold the 3 mini loaves of bread. Also, some valuable hints to help you get started).

MESSAGE FROM EGYPT

(The following message was received on August 14th from Rev. Dr. Atef Gendy, President of the Evangelical (Presbyterian) Theological Seminary, Cairo, Egypt (ETSC).

Since the Revolution of January 2011, the Church in Egypt has grown in faith and experienced God in many new ways. In addition to the continuous experience of God's protection to His church people, the Church has experienced her Lord as the Lord of History, Lord of creation and Lord of all nations. He cares not only for the spiritual matters of the Church, but also for the cries and suffering of simple and ordinary people from every background. . . . This well-known theoretical truth (has) become a lively experience that is challenging the Egyptian Church to go

Beyond her needs, fears and problems and care for her nation and society in order to be like her Lord. This was just one of the lessons we are learning probably the hard way. Nevertheless, we enjoy seeing God re-modeling our thoughts and theology.

Please pray for our students who are doing summer field ministry now in difficult situations that sometimes includes threats and many intimidations from Islamic groups, especially in small villages in the south. We ask your prayers for them, not only for protection, but also for bravery, wisdom and tender hearts that are willing to reflect the love, graciousness and care of our Heavenly Father.

Dr. Joshua Yoder and his family arrived in Cairo a few days before the military take-over at the end of June. In 1988 Presbyterian Women was created bringing together the women's organizations from the two denominations that had merged to become the Presbyterian Church(USA). Practices, programs and faithful women from both United Presbyterian Women (of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.) and Women of the Church (of the Presbyterian Church in the United States) were joined to form Presbyterian Women.

For 25 years now our beloved organization has been witnessing to the promise of God's kingdom and transforming lives around the world, And, of course, this young group is carrying on the more-than-200-year tradition of Presbyterian women meeting, praying, and acting together in shared love of God.

OVER THE PAST 25 YEARS, we have joined in mission in a variety of ways. Through Mission Opportunities and in partnership with the International Health Ministries we have donated funds to supply bicycles, mattresses, and mosquito nets in Africa.

OVER THE PAST 25 YEARS, through the Thank and Birthday Offerings we have provided funds to build schools, hospitals, domestic violence shelters, homeless shelters and transitional living shelters. We have provided money for prison ministries, education, hunger, disabilities, family, health, evangelism and so much more!

OVER THE PAST 25 YEARS THESE ARE THE FACTS AND FIGURES: The Thank Offering has totaled \$24,000,000. given to nearly 2,000 projects at home and abroad.

The Birthday Offering has been \$20,000,000. distributed to 91 projects national and international.

The total mission pledge that PW has made through their presbyteries to support mission programs and ministries has been \$70,000,000.

AMEN CORNER

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Christian Conditions

"We won't get an accurate sense of how the Christian life works if we fail to assess the conditions, or avoid facing the conditions. Conditions: weather, soil, money, racial feelings and class rivalries, tribal traditions and social costumes, technology and sex, the kinds of music played and the way language is used and the sorts of stories told. The conditions, for most of us, become assumptions. We absorb these conditions with our mother's milk and rarely, if ever, think about them. Sometimes the conditions are favorable, sometimes unfavorable to being formed in the image of God, but always they're there. We don't become Christians in a social or cultural or political vacuum. Charles Williams, in a brilliant exposition of the coming into being of the Christian community, writes that Jesus was born under three conditions: Roman power, Greek culture, and human sin. Williams convincingly insists that the Holy Spirit, which gave exposition to the life of Jesus in the shifting conditions of the centuries of the church's life, is always at work in conditions. It's not that the conditions limit the Spirit's work; instead, our Lord the spirit chooses to work within the limits. By working within these limits, the Spirit doesn't baptize the conditions—not many Christians look on first century Palestine, for example, as a golden age. What we understand here is twofold: there are virtually no conditions that preclude the Spirit's work, and the Spirit never works apart from the conditions. God can use any conditions at hand in the making of his Kingdom." From, "Leap Over a Wall: Earthy Spirituality for Everyday Christians" by Eugene Peterson. (Page
