Dinner on the Grounds following worship 2:00 p.m. Period Concert by the 73rd Ohio Volunteer Infantry Regiment Band JOE'S NOTES "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing some have entertained angels without knowing it." (NRSV Hebrews 13:2)

few years ago, I heard my former Executive Presbyter Alan Thames deliver a sermon entitled "The Holy and the Practical: What You and I Should be doing in Evangelism" quoted the above scripture. I recalled my grandmother who often quoted it to us grandchildren after she had extended some kindness to a stranger. For me it has been more than just a scripture quotation I accepted it as a sort of a personal challenge. So since then I have kept a sort of record of those stranger angel encounters. What follows is a sort spiritual narrative for your consideration.

Not so soon after in the course of one day, there were three separate opportunities to extend "hospitality" to an angel unaware. The first occurred when some one told me there was a man outside yelling to be let in so that he could pray as he put he needed to "talk with God." He was in need of help he needed some food he needed someone to listen to him he needed some one to offer prayer for him and with him. As we sat down and talked, I could see that from his agitated state he began to relax and began to feel more comfortable. I offered him the sanctuary to pray in; he said he would just stay there in the narthex. As he told me his story, I shared a bit of my own with him. I offered him some food from the table there. We prayed and he left

The next was a young man whose car ran out of gasoline just across from the church. I offered to take him to a Gas Station to buy some gas he shyly had to admit that he had no money to pay for the gas. I told him the offer still stood and I would be happy to help him if he made a promise to me. He said, "What's that?" I smiled and replied: "The next time you run across someone in a similar situation and you are in a position to help remember me helping you and

you help them." He smiled back and assured me that he would.

Later on that evening at another event about half way through a pitch in dinner an older man wandered in think that our gathering was another meeting (which was scheduled for the next evening). He seemed embarrassed some one invited him to eat and he smiled and began filling his plate. After greeting him and as the group was clearing the room to go up into the sanctuary. I sat down beside him at the table and we just talked and got to know one another better. Nothing serious nothing heavy just family, work, who do you know that I might know sort of conversation. After a while, he stood up and extended his hand, we shook hands, and as he was leaving, I made a point to invite him back again.

The best thing about trying to extend hospitality to strangers among who indeed may be angels unaware is that both of us leave the encounter feeling blessed. Therefore, as Alan challenged me that day I also challenge you to be on the lookout for those quite common moments where we can honestly reach out and for at least a moment make a difference in the

lives of those who God has sent to us.

Until next time, keep me in your thoughts and prayers and know I will be doing the same.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE MUSIC DECISIONS

Our First Presbyterian Church Worship Committee has made two decisions concerning the function and use of music in our worship services.

One decision concerns the choir's singing during our 176th Celebration on September 23rd. We want our worship that Sunday to represent as authentically as possible the worship that was celebrated at FPC during its founding year of 1842.

While researching the use of choirs in worship, we discovered that the first choir was formed in 1846 in Salt Lake Valley. So we know that there would not have been a choir helping to lead worship here in 1842. Therefore, during our 176th worship celebration, our choir members will each be a part of the larger choir (our congregation!) rather that singing as the Chancel Choir.

The second decision concerns a debate that has continued for over two years in our congregation. This involves the function and use of an instrumental postlude for our weekly worship services. While some think of the postlude as an "Amen—So Be It" part of worship that sends us out into the world, many others think it simply lets us know the service has ended. Still others consider the postlude as a performance.

Considering all of these perspectives on the use and function of the postlude, we have decided that the Choral Benediction will serve as the actual postlude (at least for now) and there will be no instrumental postlude.
