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### **OUR SESSION AT WORK**

Actually, the Session wasn't "at work" in May as five of our nine Ruling Elders could not be there due to scheduling conflicts; and, as there were no pressing issues on the agenda, we canceled May's meeting. The next meeting will be on Wednesday, June 21st.

I recently heard that some of our congregants were concerned about why Session approved having someone other than Pastor Jane lead and preach at 8 consecutive Sunday worship services beginning March 12th and ending April 30th; and why during this entire period Jane would not appear personally in the sanctuary or her office or at church committee or fellowship meetings, or visit with or call any of our congregants. In February our Session approved Jane's application for 2 months of disability leave during which these very restrictions would be required by the insurance provider.

One percent of every full-time pastor's salary goes to the Office of General Assembly to provide disability insurance. None of us expected that Pastor Jane would need to spend a period recovering from major surgery and therefore unable to provide pastoral services. But life

happens and, after a thorough consultation with an orthopedic surgeon, Jane agreed to undergo spinal laminectomy and fusion surgery to alleviate severe back pain from which she had been suffering for months. She undertook this surgery that she might better provide the pastoral services needed by the congregation.

Our Personnel Committee researched and obtained all the official medical and other forms necessary for Jane to be approved for the disability leave the surgeon said she would need. The disability insurance also paid 2/3's of Jane's salary for all but the first two weeks of her disability leave, which enabled us to pay others to lead services in her absence. Again, the major requirement for this coverage was that there could be no contact between Jane and our congregation for the full eight weeks. With generous assistance from some members and retired pastors, we covered the pastoral needs of the congregation during her absence. Thus, we were able to meet the requirement, which enabled Pastor Jane to return as a healthier member of our community of faith.

### A MESSAGE FROM COSTA RICA

Dear friends,

We are living in a time of climate crisis. Our way of living is destroying God's creation. I just finished listening to Ibram X. Kendi's "How to Be an Antiracist." It is an incredible book, and it made me think about the connections between racism and our destruction of the natural world. I would like to introduce you to two new phrases that have been pinging around in my head: ecological destructivist and ecological anti-destructivist.

An ecological destructivist is someone who expresses an idea that supports harm to or destruction of the natural world, and/or who, through action or inaction, supports policies and activities that result in harm or destruction to the natural world. An ecological anti-destructivist is someone who expresses an idea that supports care for and regeneration of the natural world, and who supports policies and participates in actions that eliminate harm to and support regeneration of the natural world. My question for myself, my family and for you is, which do you choose to be?

In 2018, the people of the Latin American Biblical University (UBL) based in the city of Montes de Oca, just to the east of San José, Costa Rica, began a journey of becoming a

"green seminary," an institution that would, in word and action, search out ways to reduce harm to ecological systems and begin regenerative practices that would help heal the damage already done. In January 2020, Jenny, Keila, Annika and I moved to Costa Rica to support this ministry. Jenny and I became part of the "Equipo de UBL Verde," the "Green UBL Team." The team is made up of students, members of the administration and faculty, including our colleague Karla Koll, also from Presbyterian World Mission. Karla is director of the seminary's College of Biblical Science and is a specialist in church history and the theology of mission; she also makes astoundingly good brownies and banana bread.

Since it began in 2018, the Green UBL Team has succeeded in making a deep impact on how the institution functions. In 2019 UBL began to address its electrical consumption by installing a large array of solar panels. In January of this year, we discovered that in 2022 the panels produced a net surplus of 5,300 kW/h. Last year, Mauricio, the university administrator, worked with handyman César to also install a simple system for collecting rainwater. The system filters the rainwater and makes it usable for washing the laundry in the residence building. Mauricio was proud to show me that in the three

months the system was operating in 2022, the university reduced its use of treated city water by around 32,000 gallons. UBL has indeed become a model for the faithful application of theologically founded practices of Earth Care.

It feels good to be part of a movement of ecological anti-destructivism. One of my main roles is helping to care for two community gardens. Huerta Rocoto or Rocoto Garden is a community garden serving the people within the university. The name for the garden, "Rocoto" comes from a Peruvian hot pepper that a residential student from Peru, Joseline, planted in 2022, a few

months before she finished her degree work and returned to her ministry in Peru. Joseline was a garden fanatic, and she pulled me into the work when I was still trying to find my place here. Joseline made me feel welcome and useful and through her, I began to feel real ownership for the work. Rocoto is now a highly productive, organic urban garden. We're producing healthy herbs and vegetables year-round; our community composting system is providing a cubic yard of compost every two or three months; we have 12 recycled tires full of composting red worms; we are producing some of our own vegetable and flower starts. Right now, we have over 200 spinach starts!

#### A MESSAGE FROM COSTA RICA (continued)

Friday has become a day when dedicated students and other volunteers work all morning weeding and fertilizing, pruning, and transplanting. In addition to the regulars, Rocoto Garden attracts international volunteers who come to UBL. Our friend Chrys initially came to UBL mainly to work in the library but has let herself get drawn deeply into the work of both Rocoto and Girasoles gardens.

Huerta Girasoles, or Sunflower Garden, is on 1,200 square yards of land that belongs to UBL. Separated from the main campus by a long cement block wall, a simple door of wood and tin roofing opens the way in. Since UBL began its ecological initiative in 2018, the Green UBL Team has had a vision of using this land to serve the local community of Cedros. A couple of ideas came and went, but the seed that germinated was to use it as a space for a second community garden "owned" and run by people from Cedros. The Green UBL Team initiated this process at the end of 2022. We now have about 18 people from Cedros who are part of an online chat group, sharing ideas and information about gardening in general, and about the Sunflowers Garden in particular.

Estrella, from Cedros, is a tall stately woman in her late 60s. Thursday is her day to water Sunflowers Garden. One of five members of the coordinating team for the garden, Estrella is the first person in our group chat to confirm her participation in each workshop and garden activity. She brought her daughter to the medicinal plants workshop in April, and she inspired Jenny and me to invent a version of BINGO based on new garden vocabulary. Estrella is also responsible for Julio. In his 70s, Julio is a handyman is the Cedros member who built the bench for the new red worms tires.

Almost all of us want to be part of something bigger than ourselves. Psalm 104 is filled with God's love for God's creation. God yearns for us to be ecological anti-destructivists. The Earth Care Pledge program, housed in the office of the Presbyterian Hunger program is one great option. 



### DIMITRY SERGAY & BUD HOBDAY GONE

To date, seven members of our church have died in 2023, leaving 44 voting members plus 10 retired ministers, and 11 frequently attending laity. The two who most recently departed were Dimitry Sergay [September 23,1923 -April 15, 2023] and Bud Hobday [November 21,1920 – May 1, 2023].

Dimitry Sergay and his wife, Phyllis, moved to Bristol Village in 2003 and joined the church in 2004. Phyllis died March 21, 20ll. Dimitry had been trained as an engineer and held several patents prior to retiring. At Bristol Village, Dimitry played the violin in the B.V. Consort for many years before it folded. He was also a Ruling Elder in our church, last serving in the Class of 2017. He moved from independent living into our Healthcare

Center and then in 2022, to Columbus nearer his son Alex where Dimitry died.

Bud Hobday and his wife, Vivian, moved to Bristol Village in 1975. Vivian died October 25, 2012. Bud was employed as head of B.V. maintenance for many years, and was an active member of the B.V. Model Railroad Club. He made so many trips to Klinker's Hardware over the years, that when he died Klinker's made a donation to the Railroad Club in his name. Bud joined our church in 2002 and spent many years lighting the candles at the beginning of the Sunday worship services. Until a very short time before his death, Bud and his good friend George Hartwell would leave the Healthcare Center and be seen chasing each other around the village streets in their motorized carts

### A WARM WELCOME TO EDY PANJAITAN

Beginning June 1, Edy will officially begin his duties as Church Choir Director and Church Pianist. Most of us have already welcomed this warm-hearted and unassuming young man, and one who acknowledges that his talent is a gift of God.

A long journey (by miles and traditions) brought Edy from Indonesia to America. Nationally recognized in his home country, he also became an internationally known musician, teacher,

and composer/ arranger. He taught at Jakarta Wesley Institute in his country, but also gained other teaching experience, publishing, and research. Edy has a list of awards, but is shy about promoting himself – when conversing with someone, he would probably turn the conversation so it centered on the other person, and their accomplishments.

Presently, Edy is pursuing a doctorate degree in Interdisciplinary Arts, having won a prestigious scholarship; and he has many responsibilities connected with Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. We first



got to know him when he came to our church to accompany Keats Rivas on his cello (Keats is now at his home in Georgia, planning for further education in the fall).

Edy was born and spent the major part of his life in Indonesia. He was an orphan since he was about 10 yrs. old; he grew up independently with an elder brother and sister.

(He is the youngest of 8 children.) His parents were lay leaders in a Methodist Church; this and other Christian influences impacted his life. He praises the community of believers who nurtured him during his development, and continues to provide love and support. "Edy's "specialty" is in teaching. He was in 6th grade when he started teaching guitar and keyboard; his students are now helping church in music ministry.

He received a bachelor in music education, and a master's degree in
