OUR SESSION AT WORK


Now that the Presbytery has approved our decision to sell our manse and garage, at its August 28th meeting, Session approved our retaining Brewster Real Estate and Auction, LLC to handle the details of the sale. In May and June, Session had had preliminary discussions with Tommy Brewster about the difference between going for a sale directly to an interested buyer or proceeding with a public auction. Tommy Brewster provided us with a copy of the State of Ohio Residential Property Disclosure Form that must be filled out in advance of a direct sale to the interested buyer to alert him/her to issues that the buyer might want addressed by the seller before the sale goes through. This can be time consuming and expensive. At its August 28th meeting, Session approved auctioning the manse and garage and I am proceeding to contact Tommy Brewster to obtain a contract and proceed.

Treasurer Mike Milam provided Session with his usual financial report that showed a deficit for the month of July of -\$7,707.53 and for the year of

-\$15,465.94 which is within the range we have been expecting.

Pastor Jane reported that she is having a very busy summer with moving out of the manse and into alternative housing, calling and visiting with multiple congregational members and friends, several of whom were having serious health issues, taking a week of vacation to visit their son, and attending continuing education events and Session committee meetings, and printing the PW booklets for Audrey. Jane will resume leading Wednesday afternoon Bible study on Wednesday, September 4th.

Session approved Personnel Committee's motion to grant Bobbie Hall an additional 60 hours of paid personal time to accommodate her recovery from her broken ankle. Mission and Evangelism reported that they will be giving \$500 to a mission listed in the Presbyterian Gift Catalogue to provide mothers and newborns around the world with basic hygene and health services.



EQUIPPING PEACEMAKERS IN CONGRE-GATIONS AND AROUND THE WORLD

A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this Offering for peacemaking efforts that align with their passion. Mid-councils retain

an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

THE FPC MATTHEW 25 ANNUAL GRANT

The First Presbyterian Church of Waverly is accepting applications for its annual Matthew 25 \$1000 grant for projects that help break though structural barriers of poverty for children and youth in Pike County and will have a sustaining impact on these young people.

The grant is open to any tax-exempt charitable organization, public school, library, or public agency serving children and youth in our area. Projects eligible for this grant may include one or more of the following:

- Advocacy changing systems that disadvantage young people.
- Collaboration programs that pull together resources to broaden support or increase the number of children served.
- Programs that result in sustained improvement in
 - learning and reading success
 - economic skills and employment opportunities
 - mental and physical health
 - respect and understanding among diverse groups in individuals
 - social, family and relationship skills
- Seed money to increase financial resources for the above purposes, e.g., matching funds and/or grant writing (for non-profits without grant writing staff)

We offer this grant out of a sense of obedience to a higher calling. Loving our neighbor, no matter what the challenge, is prompted by God's amazing grace and takes us beyond the boundaries of our congregation. We hope that this grant may just be a beginning of our attempts to reach out to the most vulnerable in our midst.

Matthew 25:40 "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers (or sisters), you did it unto me."

Grant applications will be evaluated on the following:

- Program provides hope and support for children and youth on their journey to become thriving, optimistic, independent adults and contributing members of society. This includes the ability to achieve better long term educational, economic, health, family stability and personal emotional experiences and outcomes.
- Number or percentage of children and youth impacted. Programs that provide significant long term life success on a limited number of children are considered.
- Staff and leadership strength of the program.


